



### **2021 Nuits Saint-Georges Les Roncières 1er Cru**

**(90-92)**

Drinking Window: **2025 - 2038** - Neal Martin, January 2023

The 2021 Nuits Saint-Georges Les Roncières 1er Cru is raised in 50% new oak. It has a perfumed, floral bouquet with a mixture of red and black fruit, fine delineation with more *mineralité* compared to the Aux Busselots. The palate is medium-bodied with fine grain tannins, silky smooth, harmonious with a judicious touch of spice on the finish. Quite modern in style, but this is well-crafted.

### **2021 Pommard Clos de la Commaraine**

**(90-92)**

Drinking Window: **2025 - 2038** - Neal Martin, January 2023

The 2021 Pommard Clos de la Commaraine is a monopole owned by the domaine due to be overlooked by a luxury hotel currently under construction. This is completely de-stemmed. Two bottles were opened as I was not happy with the first - and a good decision as the second is much fresher. Quite earthy in style, you might actually assume there are some stems in the mix. The palate is medium-bodied with pliant tannins, a keen line of acidity, not amazingly complex yet cohesive and with an attractive pastille-like finish. There'll be better to come, but this is commendable for a challenging growing season.

### **2021 Nuits Saint-Georges Aux Busselots**

**(89-91)**

Drinking Window: **2024 - 2034** - Neal Martin, January 2023

The 2021 Nuits Saint-Georges Aux Busselots has a fragrant, perfumed bouquet, commendable in terms of purity with Morello cherries and raspberry. The palate is medium-bodied with tart red fruit and a fine-boned structure. Perhaps, just a little New World in style towards the sweet finish, but it has a nascent playfulness that I appreciate.
